Topic presented was: An overview and introduction to the eTwinning Pedagogy.

As an Initial Teacher Education Institution, the class was shown how they can collaborate with other local or foreign studentteachers to learn, share practice and engage in innovative pedagogies through eTwinning.

During this scholastic year, I amm collaborating on the eTwinning project called: See Earth like an Astronaut along with partners from Portugal, Greece, and North Macedonia.

For the November activity, students used tablets, and, as soon as I told this to my students became very enthusiastic and looking forward. I borrowed the tablets for my Year 1 students from the Directorate for Digital Literacy and Transversal Skills.

The aim of this activity was to help the kids distinguish day from night, and, learn that the colours blue and green stand for water, vegetation, and soil, respectively. Quivervision 3D Augmented Reality App, was utilised to bring life to the colouring pages presented to the student. This app creates an interesting, educational, and magical experience by fusing innovative augmented reality technology with the traditional colouring book format.

The pupils were so amused at witnessing their illustration come to life.

eSafety and eTwinning Webinar

This online webinar was conducted by Ms. Charmaine Attard and Ms. Graziella Brincat who are both Maltese eTwinning Ambassadors.

The focus of the webinar was mainly to highlight the key importance of esafety in particular when applying it to eTwinning. Tips were recommended about ensuring online safety was carried forward such as including the importance of consent, netiquette, code of conduct, copyright infringements and proper referencing.

Furthermore, a closer look at safe communication features that are already available on the ESEP platform, was provided as part of this webinar, which included: communicating with partners through mail, teacher bulletin or also Live Call or Chat functions available on the Twinspace itself.

Web 2.0 tools on how to incorporate esafety while using eTwinning projects were presented and disseminated, giving the participants the chance to explore in their free time. This provided an opportunity for participants to identify different ways how eTwinning projects can integrate within the classroom curriculum too.
